The Parish of St. John, Trinity, wishes to thank The United Empire Loyalists for their continued dedication to assuring that we, the benefactors of our Loyalist ancestors have the continued reminder of their passion for freedom, loyalty to the Crown and their dedication to their faith.

This year we celebrate the 236th anniversary of the Landing of the Loyalists on these shores May 18, 2019 and today we honor them in this annual Worship Service on the grounds of their first consecrated church - Trinity.

Trinity parishioners continue to fondly share the Loyalist story with the citizens and visitors alike who are awe-struck at the beauty and craftsmanship that is displayed in the reconstructed (1880) Trinity post the Great Fire of 1877.

As one can readily appreciate by the immense scaffolding structure erected on the Trinity Steeple Tower, the active Trinity parishioners take the preservation of Trinity very seriously.

Trinity is pleased to host this, the annual UEL service and wish the Association many years of continued prominence in our city.

The United Empire Loyalist Story

During the American war of Independence against British rule approximately one third of the population of the Thirteen Colonies opposed the Revolution. The people were known as United Empire Loyalists.

The Loyalists suffered great persecution and the confiscation of their properties as they refused to take the oath of allegiance to the States, preferring to remain loyal to the British Crown.

The British Government offered compensation for their losses and land grants in what are now Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Quebec and Ontario. It is estimated that 40,000 to 50,000 Loyalists emigrated to Canada.

The Loyalists were Canada's first refugees. These followers of the Crown came from every walk of life and represented all classes of society, including the clergy, royal office holders, farmers, seamen, professional men, landowners, merchants, fishermen, tradesmen, industrial servants and slaves.

Although they were branded as traitors by the rebels most were intellectually and morally good men and their principals were respectful.

The Loyalists were not all of British ancestry but included Irish, Scottish, Welsh, French Huguenots with many possessing Western European lineage, including Germany, the Netherlands and others.

On May 18th, 1783, thousands of Loyalists disembarked their ships at Saint John, New Brunswick, who literally found a city overnight. One year later the Province of New Brunswick was established, separating from Nova Scotia. Two years later on May 18th, 1785, Saint John became Canada's first incorporated city.

The Old Burial Grounds Story: May 12th, 2019

From 1783 to 1847 this 4 acre plot was the final resting place of 14,000 citizens of the new city of Saint John. Only about 200 stones remain to tell their story, but brief as the tales may be, they are vivid connections with those who founded and built the city. Through readings and rubbings, we will share the stories of a few of those whose stones remain legible and through research we will share some of the legends and folktales that circulate about this hallowed downtown location. Tour will leave 115 Charlotte St. at 2:00 pm and tour ends approximately 3:30 pm.

The Hiram A. Cody Story – May 19th, 2019

Hiram A. Cody was not only a busy priest of a daughter church of Trinity's, (St. James on Broad Street) but also one of Canada's most prolific authors a century ago. Many of his stories or poems comment on the Saint John he knew as he walked its streets to carry out his priestly duties and his many-outside-the ministry calls to community service. We will learn about this cleric's life and about life he observed in the city, as we will walk some of the streets he walked within the shadow of the Trinity Steeple.
