Trinity has available brass ornament bells for a price of \$20.00 each. These bells are of a classic bell shape having a melodious tone stamped from solid brass and brightly finished & lacquered. They are made by a sixth-generation family business in Connecticut which has origins dating back to 1832. They are

the last remaining solely bell-making company in the USA. These funds will go to support the **Chiming & Timing into the Future** project which is outlined further in this Newsletter for your reference.

## **Trinity Financial Update:**



Trinity is off to a great start for 2024 with a very strong revenue due to Regular Giving. This coupled with lower Expenses mainly in the Utility account resulted in a \$12.4k improvement over budgeted Net Income basically bringing in January on a break even financially.

The Chiming and Timing Campaign team are seeking working group members for each event, and are actively seeking sponsorship for each upcoming event.



It is a catchy phrasing which describes the thrust of the total scope of the project. Phase 1a&1b will address the timing into the future with the chiming hour-by-hour on the Loyalist Bell of the new time piece which will control the Tower Clock. The new time piece will be self-controlled not requiring ongoing (weekly or monthly maintenance), having the smarts to keep on perfect time making adjustments for power failures and spring and fall settings.

- It is important to remember Trinity's Clock was one of the three city clocks which were at one time subsidized by the city for their use city wide. The other two were St. Luke's Anglican Church on Main Street and St. George's Anglican Church on the West Side. Interesting to note, all three city clocks were at Anglican Churches.
- The following phases 2 and 3 will bring on the remainder, Chiming, to have the whole system modernly upgraded to current technology.
- Phase 1a The scope of work upgraded the Tower access per the Structural Engineers' design and is now complete and paid for coming in at a total of \$32,661.50 under the estimate of \$36,483 – savings of \$3,821.50.
- Phase 1b The upgrade of the Tower Clock, its motorized mechanism, full project supporting electronics and the bell circuit equipment to ring the Loyalist bell on the hour.
- The supply of all the Bell Components for Phase 1b, Phase 2 and Phase 3 have been put on order January 19<sup>th</sup> with Verdin Company. \$38,398 Cdn – 50% on order and remaining payable upon installation.
- o **Phase 2 –** The upgrade of the bell system to incorporate the Westminster Chimes with the powering up of four additional bells. Equipment on order January 19<sup>th</sup>.
- o **Phase 3-** The upgrade of the bell system to include the remaining seven bells. (See table below.) Equipment on order January 19<sup>th</sup>.

## Reflections on last week's Services:

We find ourselves this morning reading in our Gospel's message about Thomas – doubting Thomas. Or did we just read of the message of our present world where we are all like Thomas – where we are of a world where we need to see for ourselves, touch for ourselves, hear for ourselves in order to believe for ourselves something that is in fact true for ourselves.

We arrived here just a week ago on Easter Sunday in celebration of the Risen Christ where we gathered at the entrance of Trinity and lit the new Paschal Candle (Christ Candle) and carried the light of Christ into Trinity followed by us all 'Flowering the Cross'. Whereas one of our Trinity parishioners shared with me this week, "is one of the most beautiful traditions we now celebrate here at Trinity" – as it takes us from that bare wooden cross of Good Friday where Hope is in question to bring that same wooden cross to life – clearly implying Hope is a certainty.

1<sup>st</sup> John gives us a straight-up teaching – not possibly what we want to hear – but something we must hear. The author, John, by his writing makes us look into the mirror of humanity and by doing so, if we are truly upright about ourselves, we will see much of ourselves in what the mirror is illuminating back to us.

For John it is clearly to produce fellowship with the community and fellowship with God as he states, "We proclaim to you what we have seen and heard, so that you also may have fellowship with us. And our fellowship is with the Father and with the Son, Jesus Christ". (1John 3). John continues to tell us his aim is to make them and us complete in joy, "We write this to make our joy complete".(1John 4).

As mentioned, we are of a society of seeing, touching and hearing – not that different from the community in which Jesus was born into. Jesus understood this first-hand where He told Thomas, "Put your finger here and see my hands. Reach out your hand and put it in my side. Do not doubt but believe." For God revealed Himself in a way in which He could be seen, heard and touched. And by Jesus' birth, death and resurrection, provided all with the ability to be cleansed from sin manifested in our lives, our bodies – sins that can be seen, heard and touched.

So, as we leave here today, let us not lose the feeling we all had last Sunday, Easter Sunday, where we received the Light of Christ into our midst. Where we welcomed one of Christ's newest members into His church and where we shared together in our Lord's offering at His Table – Let us carry this joy onward in our lives today and for the todays to come.

## What to expect this Sunday!
















Glory and Bala treated all to a number of their special recipes to which all were very pleased to come back for seconds and thirds. What a wonderful treat after a well-attended Trinity service.

Gasoline, Gasoline – highest prices I've ever seen – what on earth is going on with Gasoline – O' Gasoline.


Fill my tank the other night – watch that meter just spin out of sight – don't I wish they would lower the price of Gasoline – O' Gasoline.
