

We as the Parish of Trinity wished Archbishop David Edwards a happy birthday this week. Bishop David is the tenth Anglican Bishop of Fredericton, elected coadjudor bishop at a synod in Fredericton on May 10, 2014 and subsequently installed as diocesan bishop on September 20,2014 succeeding Most Reverend Claude Miller. Bishop David Edwards was elected Metropolitan of the Ecclesiastical Province of Canada and assumed this role on August 1,2020.

Archbishop David Edwards was born in Shropshire, England, attended Loughborough University, Homerton College and the University of Kent at Canterbury. Having worked as a high school teacher prior to completing diplomas in Religious and Evangelism Studies and the Masters of Arts in Applied Theology.

Archbishop David moved to Saint John NB as the Principal of Taylor College of Evangelism (Threshold Ministries) in 1998 and served as Rector at Stone Church and Parish Development Officer for the Diocese of Fredericton prior to being elected Bishop of Fredericton. He was awarded an Honorary Doctor of Divinity from Wycliffe College, Toronto in 2015 and serves on the College's Board of Trustees and also serves on behalf of the Anglican Church of Canada to the Mission to Seafarers Canada.

Archbishop David Edwards will be with us here at Trinity on May 19th for Trinity's Confirmation – please mark your calendars as a Sunday not to be missed.

Trinity Financial Update:



Trinity continues to be on a solid start for 2024

February

Regular Giving, Mission & Donation down by \$1500 to budget. Salaries & Benefits on plan, Programing Costs slightly over by \$800, Office & Administration under spent by \$630 with Utilities on plan (note there is an invoice yet to be taken in on the books), Maintenance over by \$1,300 which covered a cost from 2023

invoiced in 2024 for the repairs to Trinity Centre heating system resulting in Net Revenue for the month over by \$1k.

Year to Date – February

Revenue over plan by \$6.8k, Salaries & Benefits, Programing, Utilities for the most part on or near plan with Maintenance over plan as noted above resulting in Total Expenses under plan by \$4.6k supporting a Net Revenue position two months into 2024 \$11.4k improved over budget.

This improved position as we all remember is against a deficit budget therefore, we must not take our eye off the plan to achieve a position of \$33k over plan by year end to have a break-even year thus stemming the tide of deficit year-end results for Trinity.

E-Offering Stewardship Option

Thank you to all who are supporting Trinity through their regular stewardship, as this helps the Treasurer meet the ongoing financial needs of Trinity's ministry. Should you wish to join the E offering program, you can do so from your home by contacting Denise at 506-693-8558 or through the church email, trinsj@nb.aibn.com.

As of year-end 2023 Trinity had 16 parishioners utilizing the E Offering option for ongoing stewardship. Can we move this number upwards of 25 in 2024?



Heather & I have been coming to Myrtle Beach SC having our first visit dating back in 2005. It would then become our place to spend a spring and or fall vacation from 2010 when we purchased our East Riverside neighbour's vacation trailer while we were living in Winnipeg MB.

We have always stayed at a Christian campground - family owned and operated - called Pirate Land which is one of the largest in the area with an uninterrupted sandy beach between two great ocean piers. Church for us was always an open church setting here at the campground up to and including the day after the US election in 2016 when the wind changed. One of the greatest sins, if one can say it as such, would be for a preacher to preach politics from the pulpit. It was by this a number of couples got up and walked out of the service, while Heather and I decided to move on to another Sunday option for the following week.

We knew of the Trinity Episcopal Church a couple of kms down the beach so we tried this out. This option quickly has become our Myrtle Beach Community and we look forward to our visits each year where we are warmly welcomed each time we arrive and stay in touch while we are distant.

Trinity Myrtle Beach has an equally strong history in this community dating back to 1935 as this area was for the most part a seasonal resort community. By the efforts of a Rev. Thomas S. Tisdale who ministered in a neighbouring community worked with those of Myrtle Beach to organize a congregation here. The land was donated for the building of the church in 1937, constructed in 1939 and was admitted into the Diocese of South Carolina in 1940 and the church named Trinity Episcopal Church. The building was expanded in 1957,1968 and 1973 and raised a sum of more than \$1.2M to do so. The church in which we worship in today here was completed and consecrated in 1991 and is

responsible for the church planting in nearby Surfside Beach back in 1958 along with another in North Myrtle Beach in 1960.

Now as Anglicans we can be labeled as a denomination that does not like change – much. The old joke used to be, 'how many Anglicans does it take to change a light-bulb?' – change, my grandfather installed that light-bulb, why change it?' Well, when it comes to this Trinity Episcopal community change has come here as well. A number of years ago upon our arrival on this particular visit when Heather Google searched for their service time and there was no longer a Trinity Episcopal Church here but rather Trinity Anglican Church. Same address and for the most part same community when we arrived on that Sunday morning.

The change that has happened, they joined the Anglican Church in North America (ACNA) which has broken ties with the Archbishop of Canterbury and that is a choice they freely made. As we do by attending worship with this community. This is not the Anglican denomination sector that I am ordained nor plan to as it has restrictions within the overall community of God's children which I would never align – however what I find still with great understanding is a community who share a great deal of love, compassion and grace for which I gravitate to being in their presence while here on vacation.

When I was starting out in my career as an apprentice machinist back in the summer of 1975, my mentor of the day, a very 'old' at the time a, 55-year-old, tradesman told me to pay attention to all whom I will interact with and take the good practices of all and make them part of whom I would like to become. This is something I have continued all my life and still do – adopting the greatness from those I meet. That is where I find myself within this community – as they have so many great gifts – some of which I have incorporated into my style of worship at Trinity Saint John. Those I do not align with I leave behind.

The pictures placed here are of the sanctuary and their east window which a friend of mine here mentioned to me on Sunday past, that it was designed and created by one of their past parishioners at a cost of \$50,000. I did mention that the East Window at Trinity Saint John is insured at \$1M with the great history having been designed in England and sent over for the 1880 rebuild of Trinity after the Great Fire.

When the dust settles with all the changes that happen in life, we can get upset over this or that however where do we rest with who we are and what we are about as one of God's children here on this earth for just a spec of time to make a difference. In the words of my great friend the late Mod (Modest) Demchuk (small wooden cross originator) who was on his last days in Wpg MB at the age of 91 asked of his priest, "Do you think I have done what God willed of me to do when He created me?" That should be a question we all ask ourselves not at our last hour but repeatedly as we go through this journey we call life.

I will be off to join this group for the weekly Bible Study on Wednesday's at 7:30am where we will be looking at chapter 4 of Paul's letter to the Romans. As I say, I love this community with all their differences seeing what we have in common is significantly much more that what differs in our doctrine.

The lesson for all of us is that we have in common far out weighs what we differ. Let us continue to be that Warm Welcoming community that God wills of us here at Trinity. God bless us all.

It is a catchy phrasing which describes the thrust of the total scope of the project. Phase 1a&1b will address the timing into the future with the chiming hour-by-hour on the Loyalist Bell of the new time piece which will control the Tower Clock. The new time piece will be self-controlled not requiring ongoing (weekly or monthly maintenance), having the smarts to keep on perfect time making adjustments for power failures and spring and fall settings.

• It is important to remember Trinity's Clock was one of the three city clocks which were at one time subsidized by the city for their use city wide. The other two were St. Luke's Anglican Church on Main Street and St. George's Anglican Church on the West Side. Interesting to note, all three city clocks were at Anglican Churches.

- The following phases 2 and 3 will bring on the remainder, Chiming, to have the whole system modernly upgraded to current technology.
- Phase 1a The scope of work upgraded the Tower access per the Structural Engineers' design and is now complete and paid for coming in at a total of \$32,661.50 under the estimate of \$36,483 – savings of \$3,821.50.
- **Phase 1b** The upgrade of the Tower Clock, its motorized mechanism, full project supporting electronics and the bell circuit equipment to ring the Loyalist bell on the hour.
- The supply of all the Bell Components for Phase 1b, Phase 2 and Phase 3 have been put on order January 19th with Verdin Company. \$38,398 Cdn – 50% on order and remaining payable upon installation.

- Phase 2 The upgrade of the bell system to incorporate the Westminster Chimes with the powering up of four additional bells. Equipment on order January 19th.
- Phase 3- The upgrade of the bell system to include the remaining seven bells. (See table below.) Equipment on order January 19th.

Russia – a long way off from us - REALLY?




For those who think Russia is all the way on the other side of the world. It is approximately 55 miles from the United States at the Bering Strait's narrow point. However, in the body of water between Alaska and Russia, known as the Bering Strait, there lies two small islands known as Big Diomede and Little Diomede.
