**Trinity Security Message** On Sundays, the Charlotte Street door will be locked at 10:30 am. There will be appropriate signage affixed at the Charlotte Street entrance directing all who arrive after 10:30 am to the West entrance of Trinity through the large Red Doors which will be open and welcoming to all.



I always enjoy watching late Anglicans entering church as the service is about to finish – as those who forgot to turn their clocks back before they went to bed on Saturday evening.

This Sunday will be the first trial on Trinity's new clock where it is to correct automatically to the end of Day-Light Savings Time – the first Sunday in November - all on its' own. The Modem programing is to make the correction at 2am – as opposed to having our Bell / Clock maintenance fellow climb the Steeple Tower and manually make this adjustment before we all arrive on Sunday morning.

We will see you for 10:30am or 11:30am depending on your pre-planning and setting up your clocks for the 'Fall Back' winter time adjustment.

# **Trinity Financial Update**



**August – Revenue** – was \$8.5k under budget with the following areas contributing to this shortfall, \$1.5k below in Regular Offering, \$1.8k below in the monthly donations and \$5k below in Unrestricted Investment Income (timing issue for this revenue stream)

**August – Expenses** – Salaries and Benefits, Programs and Office and Administration on plan. Maintenance was over plan by \$1.3k due to unplanned Fire

Marshall testing and certifications. Total Expenses came in \$1.5k over plan.

August – Net Income was under plan by \$10k

**Year to Date – August – 2024 – Revenue –** YTD is \$18.8K ahead of plan. **Expenses –** were \$7.1 over plan. This results in a **Net Revenue** of (-\$26.3k) against a budget Net Revenue for April YTD of (-\$38k).

#### **E-Offering Stewardship Option**

Thank you to all who are supporting Trinity through their regular stewardship, as this helps the Treasurer meet the ongoing financial needs of Trinity's ministry. As of year-end 2023 Trinity had 16 parishioners utilizing the E Offering option for ongoing stewardship. Can we move this number upwards of 25 in 2024? As of this week, Trinity remains at 16 on E-Offering.

**Last Sunday at Trinity** Last Sunday, Trinity celebrated the 23<sup>rd</sup> Sunday after Pentecost. We were pleased to have Rev. Peter Gillies with us once again providing clergy coverage for Rev. Steven's fall absence with James McKenna assisting as Layreader.

The gospel reading from Mark 10:46-52 provides us with an experience where ones' faith results in answered prayers having Jesus performing yet again another miracle. Bartimaeus, who was blind and identified as a beggar was on the side of the road as Jesus and His disciples were walking by. From the scripture we can assume that those near him must have identified it was Jesus who was passing by and from this, he called out, "Jesus, Son of David, have mercy on me". As Rev. Peter mentioned, one might well have some reference of who Jesus was, but having Bartimaeus call out Jesus for whom He truly is, "Jesus of Nazareth, Son of David would be nothing short of sacrilege – so those near him urged him to be quiet (silent) – not to bring any undue

attention on himself or them from possible authorities or those who might inform the authorities. He, not taking their guidance, repeated, "Jesus of Nazareth, Son of David, have mercy on me." From this second cry, Jesus heard Bartimaeus. He may well have heard the first cry but waited to see if Bartimaeus would bow down to those around him and be silent – however he was ever more insistent and by this Jesus recognized

Bartimaeus depth of his faith. By this, his request to have his eyesight restored was granted. And we are told by this Bartimaeus joined in the group following Jesus on His way after this miracle took place.

Rev. Peter would suggest that Bartimaeus is representative of you and I. In other words, an experience that occurred over 2000 years ago is as relevant today is it was in its' day. It is up to us to affirm whether our faith is as firm as Bartimaeus's when life throws us a curve. We are not informed how long Bartimaeus had been blind, but suffice to say it has been years not months to have him identified as a beggar on the side of the road when Jesus and His disciples passed by. If we had an equally disabling illness, would we maintain our faith like he did? That is our challenge as we all have time to work on our faith journey as we are all still alive and able to be more intentional with our spiritual life.

Rev. Peter shared his call as a Christian dating back to 1980 and it happened through a relationship he had with the Rector of Trinity back in the day – where he explored his perceived life changing experiences which by the assistance of the Rector, recognized his life was changing. By Rev. Peter's shared story of conversion or Christian awareness he mentioned for some this awareness might well happen as it did for him however for others it may be alike a bolt of lighting – sudden or for others it is like a tonne of bricks with one brick at a time.

**Trinity – Myrtle Beach**: In the Isaiah reading selected for Trinity on this Sunday, Isaiah 59:9-20 we are reminded that justice, righteousness, hope and fairness seem to be far off if not unreachable at times.

As this was being referenced, I allowed my mind to wander somewhat to the upcoming US election which is only nine days away from this day. All of the above are at great risk with one of the options that will be on the ballet – however it would appear many, even most I know in this parish are parking their faith principals and voting for one that has done everything against ones' faith and staying true to their party colors. Enough of my personal comments.

The message went on to the Gospel and picked up on a level of popular pressure. Bartimaeus was urged to be silent when it came to his faith – not to be vocal on identifying Jesus for whom He was as it might cause unpleasant political outcomes to happen to him and those around him. This pressure to step back happens to most of us from time to time where we pull back in conversation rather than be vocal for fairness, justice and what is right under the umbrella of ones' faith – as it may not be the popular.

Jesus, Himself underwent a series of temptations, most notably after His Baptism and we see temptations occurring ongoingly through scripture where often those tempted, step back and become silent. The most crucial of these experiences happened during Jesus' trial – where all present were silent Would we have been any different if we were standing there in the courtyard. The fact is temptations are part of our life and are the product of Satan. I recalled, during this message, the learning shared with me a couple of decades ago, by Rev. Hugh Walker in Thunder Bay ON where he was making the reference with regard to addiction pressures, referencing this negative force being that of Satan who is always on our shoulder waiting for us to invite him in. The reality remains, the difference between those addicted to what ever vice they have and others is the defence systems ones has built up. We need this defence as Christians and we need to keep our guard up continually so that we don't step back and be silent when it is our turn to share our voice or actions in the name of our faith.

November 3<sup>rd</sup> Trinity will celebrate All Saints Sunday and we will recognize all the 'saints' in our lives who have helped shape us to be the people we are today. In recognition of honoring 'our' saints <u>there will be tables set up at the foot of the Chancel steps for your cherished love-ones' photographs</u>. We will be bringing intentional focus to 'our' saints on this Sunday. Please bring out 'your' saints' photographs to have them more physically present as we honor them. Pictured here are my grandparents, Helen (Nellie) & Roy Scribner who had the farm in Kingston where I spent every available moment of time growing up.

There should be an extra month of the year called BEACHEMBER.




