# **Trinity Financial Update**



**October – Revenue** – was \$3.2k under budget with regular offering showing still positive against plan. Donations were over plan by \$3.2k with Fundraiser income under plan by \$8.8k – due to the timing in the budget – the Union Club Dinner happened in the spring however budgeted in the fall.

**October – Expenses** – Salaries and Benefits on plan. Programs was under plan by \$6k attributed to fundraising expenses that did not occur associated with the

aforementioned timing of the Union Club Dinner. Office and Administration along with Utilities were both basically on plan. Maintenance was over plan by \$1k. Total Expenses came in \$5.9k under plan mostly attributed to the fundraising expenses not incurred.

October – Net Income was improved by \$2.7k

**Year to Date – October– 2024 – Revenue –** YTD is \$19.4K ahead of plan. **Expenses –** were \$1k under plan. This results in a **Net Revenue** of (-\$18.8k) against a budget Net Revenue for Sept YTD of (-\$39.2k).

#### **E-Offering Stewardship Option**

Thank you to all who are supporting Trinity through their regular stewardship, as this helps the Treasurer meet the ongoing financial needs of Trinity's ministry. As of year-end 2023 Trinity had 16 parishioners utilizing the E Offering option for ongoing stewardship. Can we move this number upwards of 25 in 2024? **As of this week, Trinity remains at 17 on E-Offering.**

#### Last Sunday at Trinity: Last Sunday Trinity celebrated the Second Sunday of Advent.



Pontius Pilate, Herod, Philip, Lysanias, Annas and Caiaphas. Men of history that most of us don't hear much about except in this week's Gospel reading and some in the recounting of Christ's Passion.

At the time of the writing of Luke's Gospel, it was important to include these details as they made contextual sense to the original audience. To us today, they are just passing details before getting to the heart of the story: John the Baptist as the voice crying out in the desert, fulfilling the prophecy of Isaiah. These are names we know!

Last week we talked about keeping Christ in Christmas – remembering the Christmas's of our past and what made them great and Christ' centred. When we think

back to these days we quite often focus on the highs of our life and less on the lows and that is a good thing – that is what God would wish for us. To celebrate the gifts, the blessings we have had at His mercy.

Here today I can't help but think about the world we live in, our own country's politics and those near to us, the world at large, how we get so caught up and divided at times and even depressed at times. It's quite disheartening to see how easily so many Christians across the political spectrum forget ultimately who we are and to whom we belong especially in an election year for us provincially, as it is south of us and will be for us next year federally. We get caught up on the emotions of winning or losing and lose the perspective of the larger picture. We worry about our lot in life at times when the powers shift, however just recently talking to the investment world, the shift in powers close to home or abroad rarely if ever have had a lasting affect on the world when one looks historically. However, we still have anxieties over change.

As serious as the politics of a given time are, this Gospel speaks about how they are also fleeting in the face of God's everlasting message and plan. The political climate changes, has changed and will continue to change and we will be okay.

That is sort of what John is talking about. He's fulfilling a prophecy that came some 700 years before he was born! Seven-hundred years before I was born was the year 1256, our country wouldn't exist for another 611 years. Yet, people were proclaiming the Word of God then as they were in John's time years earlier and in Isaiah's time centuries before that, and as they are now.

It is a call relevant to every believer through the ages, "Prepare the way of the Lord, make straight his paths." What is "the way of the Lord"? It is through the human heart. That is the path we're called to prepare, to make straight, to untangle. This is the essence of the work we are called to do in this season of preparation which we call Advent. We started this work on the Thursday evening prior to Advent at the Service of Light where we focused on self-care. Life is not straight-forward by any means. In this world, it is so easy to get twisted around, to believe that things are as bad as they could be, to despair looking into the darkness, or to feel lost in a desert, disagreeing and disconnecting from those around us. We could very easily want to coil up on the couch and will the day, week, year to pass. That is precisely where God's word comes to us as it did to John.

We are all called to continue the work John the Baptist started and that being – sharing the God's invitation to have us and others join with Him in community and faith. God pours his grace and mercy out on the world through the love and work and prayers of each of us and for all of us.

"Every valley shall be filled and every mountain and hill shall be made low." All shall be level; all shall be equal. There are many graphics out their that show us that no matter who we are or what we have done or

accomplished in this life, in the end we are all equal in God's sight. As we come into another season of Advent, God is inviting us to rest in his great constancy. With His foundational message the shifting tides of the world should not disturb us.

We are to come to God with our minds troubled by sin and evil, to repent, and to allow him to smooth the ways of our hearts so that his love and his message can travel to us, through us, and to others. In order for this to happen, myself personally, I have to make room, let God handle what I am not able to handle, so there is room, so there is an opportunity for myself to actually hear God in my life.

I remember when I was in seminary studies back in Winnipeg once saying to one of my professors, "I have hit the saturation point in my mind, not unlike my computer presently as the memory is full, and in order for something more to be retained, something has to go." We get our minds and our hearts full of life issues ongoing and we leave precious little room for God to enter.

I would like to leave you with these words of St. Teresa of Avila as a reminder to prepare ourselves in imitation of Christ for the blessings that God has for this world in this time, just as he did over 2,000 years ago:

"Christ has no body but yours,
No hands, no feet on earth but yours,
Yours are the eyes with which he looks
Compassion on this world,
Yours are the feet with which he walks to do good,
Yours are the hands, with which he blesses all the world."

This Sunday at Trinity we will be celebrating the Third Sunday of Advent. JOY.

History is indeed in the making for sure – in restoring the twelve-bell Carillon along with incorporating the latest of technology upgrading the four-face Trinity Tower Clock. There will be a video presentation, a few short speeches, recognition and a light sweet for our enjoyment. Come out and be part of this historic moment for our historic church. See you there

The target completion for this project has been achieved December 2024! The Bells, originally rung Christmas 1882, will be proudly played once again for Christmas 2024. Let us all 'chime in' as we complete the Trinity Tower's purpose proudly standing tall on our city's peninsula.



On the very onset of the thought of restoring the twelve-bell carillon which had gone silent over the past couple of years, Susanne Sutton & Father David Kierstead put their heads together and thought 'what could we do in a small way to bring not only some attention to this valued project but also contribute to its' financial goal. Susanne found in her research that Lee Valley marketed a quality brass bell from an age-old manufacturer in the USA and off she went. These bells have been ordered over the past year in quantities of 50, 100, and 200 to the point when I pick up our next order in Lee Valley in Halifax NS, those in the shipping department always come out and want to meet the one who is ordering this product in mass. What a wonderful moment results as I can inform them of the significance of this little bell to the twelve -bell carillon system originally installed in Trinity's 1882 Steeple Tower.

As we prepare to officially close this very successful project – we have for your hard to buy for person this Christmas, or simply to treat yourself with a beautiful reminder of Trinity restoring the musical gifts of the 1882 bells this year – you can pick up one or more at Trinity on Sundays or through the week by contacting the office for a donation of \$20. They are nicely packaged in a black velvet bag with a red ribbon for ease to hang on your Christmas Tree or attach to a special present to those you love.

Let us continue to ring those bells – even at home with this 'little' brass bell.

When you hear the bells ring in their fullness for the first time Christmas 2024 you can proudly say, "I was there when we announced this project", "I was a part of this project's success" and I was there for the Gala as we together restored the Trinity Carillon. Well done!
