### Trinity Security Message:

The Charlotte Street door will be locked at 10:30 am on Sunday morning. There will be appropriate signage affixed at the Charlotte Street entrance directing all who arrive after 10:30 am to the West entrance of Trinity through the large Red Doors which will be open and welcoming to all. This will remain in place until Trinity moves into winter operation when the West Entrance is closed for the season (to conserve heat). At that time the Charlotte Street doors will remain open with due diligence in place to monitor this entrance during worship.

### Trinity Financial Update



**October – Revenue** – was \$3.2k under budget with regular offering showing still positive against plan. Donations were over plan by \$3.2k with Fundraiser income under plan by \$8.8k – due to the timing in the budget – the Union Club Dinner happened in the spring however budgeted in the fall.

**October – Expenses** – Salaries and Benefits on plan. Programs was under plan by \$6k attributed to fundraising expenses that did not occur associated with the aforementioned timing of the Union Club Dinner. Office and Administration along with Utilities were both basically on plan. Maintenance was over plan by \$1k. Total Expenses came in \$5.9k under plan mostly attributed to the fundraising expenses not incurred.

**October – Net Income** was improved by \$2.7k

**Year to Date – October– 2024 – Revenue** – YTD is \$19.4K ahead of plan. **Expenses** – were \$1k under plan. This results in a **Net Revenue** of (-\$18.8k) against a budget Net Revenue for Sept YTD of (-\$39.2k).

## E-Offering Stewardship Option

Thank you to all who are supporting Trinity through their regular stewardship, as this helps the Treasurer meet the ongoing financial needs of Trinity's ministry. As of year-end 2023 Trinity had 16 parishioners utilizing the E Offering option for ongoing stewardship. Can we move this number upwards of 25 in 2024? **As of this week, Trinity remains at 17 on E-Offering.**

**Last Sunday at Trinity** Last Sunday Trinity celebrated the Last Sunday after Pentecost, The Reign of Christ or Christ the King Sunday. Also, we celebrated the Sacrament of Baptism, where Olivia Scout Dumville-Wilson was welcomed into Christ's Church.



The Gospel reading from John 18:33-37 provides us the dialogue between Jesus and Pilate centred around the title of King being applied to Jesus. This was troublesome to Pilate and would be to any earthly ruler as not to have his / their authority undermined.

We read from John's writings in Revelations 1:4-8 when he was banished off to a remote island, Patmos, which spoke loudly of Christ being very much alive. John's writings come after the cross and having him in circulation speaking of the living Christ was again troublesome to Pilate – hence the efforts to silence him by placing him on an island.

The Romans thought they had dealt with Christ by the physical death and public display of same – yet John spoke differently in that Christ was alive.

John wrote of who Jesus is by calling our attention to; Jesus' as the faithful witness encouraging others who might follow in faith to be strong and stand fast regardless of the persecution that might happen. He also cited that Jesus was the first one to overcome death paving the way for all believers and all would one day have to answer to Christ – no ruler will escape this reality. John also referenced what Jesus has done; having freed us from our sins by His blood. Informing us that His return will be very visible reminding us that He is the Alpha and the Omega, the beginning and the end. Through Olivia Scout's baptism, all present were invited to once again reminded of the promises we are all to live up to in our own lives and by doing so are forever treasured possessions of our Lord's blessings. The Sacrament of Baptism embraces three facets of Christ's Church, being, repentance through the water, recalling the work done on the Cross and the ever presence of the Holy Spirit. Through ones' baptism we are forever grafted into both Christ and the Christian Church thus making us stronger than we would be on our own. Olivia Scout received the Light of Christ (Baptismal Candle) and a Children's picture Bible from the parish.

A great day at Trinity – celebrating Christ the King Sunday along with welcoming Olivia Scout into His Church.

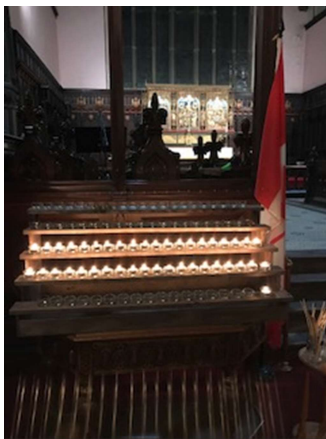

**Service of Light (Blue Christmas)** Trinity's Service of Light will be held on Thursday November 28<sup>th</sup> at 7pm. This will be the 7<sup>th</sup> annual Service of Light here at Trinity. In some faiths, this service is referred to as the Blue Christmas service. We see this not as being 'blue' but rather full of light as we come before the cross in our music, scripture and prayers raising up our cares to the one and only one who truly can take care of them. There will be a candle stand, as you see pictured where you may light as many candles as you wish, one for each care you have. Some light them for those in their lives they don't see physically anymore. Others light them for those who need healing. And still others light candles for relationships or special circumstances that are ongoing in their lives that they would like improved.
