Trinity Financial Update



November – Revenue – was \$1.8k under budget with regular offering showing \$2k under against plan. Donations and Fundraising income were slightly over plan for the month.

November– Expenses – Salaries and Benefits, Programs, Office and Administration, Maintenance and Financing were all slightly under plan. Utilities

was under plan by \$2.6k due to timing of the invoice for the month of November and will correct itself in December prior to year end.

November – Net Income was improved by \$1.8 on this report however with the delayed invoice for Utilities November was in actual

Year to Date – November– 2024 – Revenue – YTD is \$17.6K ahead of plan. **Expenses –** were \$4.61k under plan. This results in a **Net Revenue** of (-\$22.2k) against a budget Net Revenue for Sept YTD of (-\$49.5k).

E-Offering Stewardship Option Thank you to all who are supporting Trinity through their regular stewardship, as this helps the Treasurer meet the ongoing financial needs of Trinity's ministry. Last Sunday at Trinity: Last Sunday Trinity celebrated The Baptism of the Lord and we looked at the Gift of Baptism and how much we really understand this gift as we journey through life today.

In our younger days many of us would have played the board game, Monopoly, and remembering this game there was the dreaded 'Jail' space where one would if landed upon miss a turn. Getting there one might land on the space, or pick up a chance or community chest card directing us to go there or throw three sets of double dice in succession. However, there was also a chance card that would be a Get out of Jail free card which would be insurance against such an unfortunate stroke of bad luck.

Well, is that what we think Baptism is – a sort of 'get out of jail free (trouble) card?

Not really, our baptism was never marketed as to prevent us from experiencing loss or hurt, life struggles or difficulties or avoid the challenges in life. What baptism is, is it changes us and offers us a way through those difficulties, sorrows, problems, circumstances and yes even more importantly, a way through what we would call our physical death. It provides a source of light that the darkness of life's circumstances does not overcome us.

By baptism the Holy Spirit became the main distinctive blessing of the New Age. A New Age that Christ Himself inaugurated and by doing so, made possible for you and I our salvation by the sanctification of water for our baptism.

As we journey through life, we would be well advised to revisit -often, our Baptismal Covenant where we;

- We confess our belief in God, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, because God first believed in and chose us.
- We continue in the apostles' teaching and fellowship, in the breaking of bread, and in the prayers because the Holy Spirit has descended upon and filled us.
- We persevere in resisting evil, and whenever we fall into sin, repent and return to the Lord because the heavens have been opened to us and we have seen our true home.
- We proclaim by word and example the good news of God in Christ because we have heard the voice from heaven declare us beloved children in whom He is well pleased.
- We seek and serve Christ in all persons, loving our neighbor as ourselves; striving for justice, peace, and dignity for every human being because that is how God has treated us and how could we do any less for another one of his children.

When we find ourselves challenged, open ones' prayerbook to the Baptismal Covenant and quietly read and take to heart the promise we have made and then try to live life more in line with these promises.





Personal note as I completed my CPE (Clinical Pastoral Education – Chaplaincy Training) at Riverside Mental Health in Selkirk MB, I quickly learned we all have a level of mental heath sensitivities and depending on our personal experiences and circumstances our mental health can become fragile.

Please think about this opportunity to be guided in a number of life challenging pressures we accept but rarely know what to do with them to keep our health – healthy.

I have set up with Mr. Rick C. Benson, B.A. B.Ed., M.A. Licensed Counselling Therapist, Grief Loss & Life Transitions, Spiritual Health Counsellor / Educator, Author/Speaker to offer a two day session which will cover many areas we all find challenging to navigate when life throws us those curve balls. I have personally attended two of Rick's programs in the past and have a copy of his book which I have read a couple of times.

The Guess Who band hailed from Winnipeg MB. From Randy Bachman's story telling he mentioned the start of this band having cut a single, sent it out with a band name which was refused as it was infringing on another bands name. After a couple of attempts to get their single pressed, they sent it in – in desperation with a white label and put the band name on it as the 'Guess Who'. The name stuck and they were a very successful band in their day. While living in Winnipeg MB Heather and I were treated to a number of Burton Cumming's and Randy Bachman concerts. There is a concert hall named in Wpg as the Burton Coming's theater in honor of a local boy's success. Burton and Randy wrote a couple of their hits in Burton's grandmothers' home as I remember the stories told. The drummer lived next door to one of my parishioners in Wpg and his stories of the parties held there while the parents were away for the weekends were legionary.

Remember when? Remember when one could take typing in High School as a credit course? Not sure when they discontinued the course, however in my grade twelve year at Millidgeville North High School I



enrolled in grade 10 typing. Not overly sure why, probably looking for an easy credit – lazy student, but it may also had something to do about meeting girls. The odds were better for us boys in this class. What turned out to be a lark at the time, resulted in one of the most beneficial courses in my high school years as within a couple of years post high school, computers were coming on strong and I could type over 45 words a minute all due to my decision back in grade 12. Still today, I can type along with the best of them and what a benefit in my numerous university courses this turned out to be.

Vintage Uptown Pictures:



South-west corner of King Square – Charlotte Street looking South. We see the Riviera Restaurant & Starboard Lounge, the Odeon Cinema and the Admiral Beatty Hotel and Air Canada and other businesses on the East side of Charlotte St heading South. Recent re-work of Charlotte St. and King Square South has changed this yet once again.



Kanes Corner with J. Splane Sporting Goods store on the right corner of Thorne Ave and Bayside Drive – they having moved there from Main Street where Keddy Hotel was built I believe. With the Esso and Irving competing on the other side of the intersection. There must have been a business by the name of Kane's there at one time to get the name attached and remains with those of us of a certain vintage.



Haymarket Square area heading East with the Irving gas bar and garage on the right just prior to crossing the Marsh Creek bridge. Crystal Ice I believe was on the left on the other side of the bridge. I remember the Crystal Ice truck delivering blocks of ice on those hot summer days to our next-door neighbour in the early 1960's. We would jump up on truck and grab chunks of ice while the delivery was being made. By the looks of the vehicles the photo would appear to be dated in the late 1960's. I was always in awe of the use of limestone in the Irving construction – very distinctive and expect somewhat costly as they continued with this signature style for their gas stations back in the day.
