Annual General Meeting AGM - for the Parish of Saint John, Trinity Anglican Church will be held on March 9, 2025 immediately following the regular Sunday Worship Service. The meeting will be held in the Bennett Room and a light lunch will be provided. Please plan to attend as we review the great year the parish has had in 2024, the successful trending over the past number of years and be part of the planning for yet another great year 2025.

Trinity Financial Update



December – Revenue – was \$38k over budget with regular offering showing \$7k under against plan. Donations were over plan by \$36k due to the McKean Family Foundation being reconciled by RBC Wealth Management Toronto and funds that were deemed under distributed over past years were made current – with the sum of \$32,942 being received along with \$2.4k donation through Canada Helps site from an individual donor.

December– Expenses – Salaries and Benefits, Programs and Office and Administration were on or near plan for the month. Utilities was over plan by \$2.7k attributed by delayed billing from Liberty thus Nov & Dec billing received in Dec. Maintenance was over plan by \$2.5k attributed to the resolve of the domestic hot water issue that has been ongoing for the past couple of years in Trinity Centre resulting in replacement of a pump and valves. Financing was over plan by \$3.3k due to timing of the invoice for the annual professional fees.

December - Net Income was improved by \$30k due to the above unexpected funds received as noted

Important to note – The December numbers will have a couple of adjustments due to the delay in invoicing as a result of the Postal Strike however in essence the month was a very good month for Trinity financially.

Year to Date – December– 2024 – Revenue – YTD is \$55.7K ahead of plan. **Expenses –** were \$2.8k over plan. This results in a **Net Revenue** of \$15K against a budget Net Revenue for Dec YTD of (-\$37.7k). An overall improvement against the deficit budget of \$52.9k.

Important to note – The December year end numbers will have a couple of adjustments due to the delay in invoicing as a result of the Postal Strike however in essence 2024 ended very good for Trinity financially.

E-Offering Stewardship Option Thank you to all who are supporting Trinity through their regular stewardship, as this helps the Treasurer meet the ongoing financial needs of Trinity's ministry. Trinity has currently 18 parishioners utilizing the E Offering option for ongoing stewardship. Thank you for your continued support.

Last Sunday at Trinity: Last Sunday Trinity celebrated The Fifth Sunday after Epiphany and focused on the frustration that Simon must have felt when he and his partners had fished all night long and came up empty only to be approached by Jesus to push out and drop his clean gear once again in the water.



Frustration comes wrapped in many different packages; when we were much younger the dating scene would have been a source of frustration. Move forward a few years and for some, waiting to be blessed by becoming a mother or father for the first or subsequent times. Raising children brings on its' own stresses and frustrations. In the working world, career ups and downs often are sources of frustrations.

This in a small way may help us appreciate Simon's state when approached by Jesus on this morning. How many times have we been in a situation, frustrated and approached by someone who we feel has little to offer technically to the situation at hand and gives direction. Here, Simon might have thought, oh, great, a rabbi telling me, a professional fisherman, how to fish. He may have initially objected, but as we know the story, he conceded and out they went and dropped his nets.

This scripture provides us three reminders embedded in this story for us today;

- 1) What the eye sees. Did Jesus actually create the abundance of fishes for this occasion or did Jesus have the discerning eye to know which shoal would be the one to drop the nets on that morning. We need the eye that really sees. When we think about it, many saw steam rise from the lid of a kettle; only James Watt went on to invent the Steam Engine. Many saw the apple fall; only Isaac Newton saw it for what it was, and developed the Law of Gravity.
- 2) The Spirit of effort. It takes some effort for us to get up and get going at times. We get urges at times and yet we continue to sit back. Simon, tired and frustrated as he was, was prepared to try against all known odds to put his cleaned gear back in the water not giving up that morning. How many of us when facing our own frustrations give up one effort too soon?
- 3) Willing to attempt the hopeless. All the circumstances at play this particular morning would have convinced the skilled fisherman that going out at this late time in the day, based upon he fishing timetable, is all but hopeless. Simon, putting his gut feelings aside, saying, "If you say so, lets' go." How often do we wait for everything to be perfect? If we do subscribe to this belief, we will never begin at all.

In keeping with Pope Francis' guide for us preachers; - keep it to ten – twelve minutes and provide a;

Focus of the Message: We are worthy of God's graces regardless. In reality our future miracles rests with us.

Call to action: If we want a miracle, we must open our eyes, get up and get going and accept that what we believe needs to happen is not conditional on the miracle happening in our presence.

This Sunday at Trinity This Sunday Trinty will be touching the teachings of Jesus through the Beatitudes – what do they say literally and what did Jesus want to convey to His listeners to help guide them in their future days and years?

Shrove Tuesday - otherwise known as Pancake Tuesday - originated with a way for a family to use up the rich foods like eggs, milk and sugar before Lent's fasting and abstinence begin. This is the reason pancakes became associated with this day – they're a dish that can use all these ingredients.

This is a time we as Christians give up some of our luxuries to remember when Jesus went into the desert for 40 days to fast and pray. The word shrove comes from a Roman Catholic practice – to 'shrive' meant going to confess your sins and being absolved by a priest. In times past there would be the ringing of the 'shriving' bell calling people to the church to confess their sins before Lent began.



Heritage Week at Trinity David Goss and Harold Wright are organizing the Heritage Fair once again at Trinity – with displays being presented in the Bennett Room on Saturday, February 22nd.



Harold Wright is organizing the 125th Anniversary Memorial Service for the Battle of Paardeburg which was a significant battle in the Boer War which involved the 2nd Battalion, Royal Canadian Regiment. This was the Regiment's first overseas action, and was the first loss of the Regiment's troops during that war, including the first Canadian who was from New Brunswick. Of significant historical reference, the first Memorial service for the South Africa war was held here at Trinity in 1900 with the only original Order of Service held at the New Brunswick Museum archives. You can see there is a plaque proudly displayed on Trinity's wall near the north-east of the Nave – pictured here.

This memorial service will be held in Trinity on Friday, February 21st at 1:30pm.

On Saturday, February 22nd at 2pm Harold Wright will be presenting a talk on the use of Balloons in the war – with this presentation being held in Trinity church also.

Mark your calendars. Last year was a resounding success with many wonderful and informative displays of historic memorabilia with stories and facts shared by a number of dedicated individuals and organizations passionate in sharing our history.

7th Trinity Speaker Dinner Series


By way of this announcement please be advised the opportunity to reserve your ticket and or sponsorship is open for Trinty's 7th Speaker Dinner Series.

- 1. We are not meant to deal with grief loss and life transitions alone. Resiliency is more effective when we involve OTHERS.
- 2. Your experience is UNIQUE ... no exceptions.
- 3. You are on a SPIRITUAL journey. There is a mystery and not a coincidence.
- 4. To search for MEANING is more realistic than searching for happiness. Who am I now?



We know this is Trinity, and this present Trinity is the rebuild after the 1791 original Trinity burnt to the ground in the Great Fire of 1877. This 'new' Trinity is the 1880 rebuild.




Susanne Sutton, one of our Trinity layreaders, along with a colleague in Utah, has been working since 2021 on the upcoming edition of Dorothy Wordsworth's Rydal Journals, a set of 15 notebooks covering the years 1824-1835 that have never before been published in their entirety. She began working on Dorothy in 1989 for her Master's degree and visited Gasmere, in England's Lake District, during the summers of 2008-10 and 2013 to transcribe from the original notebooks. When she retired from teaching in 2021, she and Nick Mason, head of English at Brigham Young University, were contracted by Liverpool University Press to produce a manuscript for publication, working from high-quality photographs of the notebook pages so that further travel to England wasn't necessary. The 900plus-page book is due out sometime in the next few months and is available for pre-order on Amazon for \$270 CAD. If you're interested, though, a much less expensive abridged version will be available in paperback about 3 years from now. Susanne says this is a dream come true for her, but she's also looking forward to a bit more down time, now that it's finished, and the opportunity to become more involved in events at Trinity.
