

Last Sunday at Trinity: Last Sunday Trinity celebrated The Seventh Sunday after Epiphany and looked at Jesus' teachings which followed those of the Beatitudes. We are told to Love thy neighbour as thyself – Love thy enemies – Love those who do wrong to you.

The issue for us is that we have a very singular definition of Love for the most part while the Greeks had a number of words for Love which using their vocabulary helps us understand what Jesus is saying when He asks us to Love those who are not very Lovely.

The Greeks use the following: Eros = which is that passionate love we have between couples. Philia = which describes that warm affection we have towards others and / Agape = which is the benevolence towards others.



The love that Jesus is referring to is Agape where we will extend the best we can to all, even when they do not do the same towards us. In this scripture we have what know as the Golden Rule - Do unto others as we would have them do unto us. By doing this we are an extension of God's love through our actions.

In other words, when our Lord calls us to a love that extends even to the enemy-even to those who hate us and revile us—He is calling us to the love by which He Himself loved us and the world. Christ died for sinners who hated him. He prayed for the forgiveness of those who nailed him to the cross. He never met hatred in kind but always sought to overcome it with love. This is the higher love displayed in Christ that the world simply does not know or comprehend.

Taking the higher road always – often the road less travelled – and often not the easiest of road to take. Human nature urges us to get into the ditch and battle it out ill deed for ill deed – and by this we think we get some sort of satisfaction.

We read in scripture over and over that Jesus was all for those who would turn around their lives. Right up to the end, we have that exchange in Luke's gospel with the criminal on the cross, only one of the two with Jesus who, by recognizing Jesus for whom He truly was, was promised paradise with Jesus. We receive our Absolution within the BCP Morning Prayer service, where I say in part, "Almighty God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who desireth not the death of a sinner, but rather that he may turn from his wickedness, and live ..." Speaks about His overall desire be there for us and never against us.

As hard as it may be, for our better health, we need to always try to lean towards loving our neighbour or our so-called enemy as any other option will cost us dearly.

Message Focus – Identify the type of Love that Jesus is speaking of – being that of benevolence Call to Action - Try to take the higher road always - resist in joining in the fray of the issue




Shrove Tuesday otherwise known as Pancake Tuesday originated with a way for a family to use up the rich foods like eggs, milk and sugar before Lent's fasting and abstinence begin. This is the reason pancakes became associated with this day – they're a dish that can use all these ingredients. This is a time we as Christians give up some of our luxuries to remember when Jesus went into the desert for 40 days to fast and pray. The word shrove comes from a Roman Catholic practice – to 'shrive' meant going to confess your sins and being absolved by a priest. In times past there would be the ringing of the 'shriving' bell calling people to the church to confess their sins before Lent began.



Heritage Week at Trinity



On Friday February 21st Trinity hosted the 125th Anniversary service of the Battle of Paardeberg – of the Boer War 1899-1900. We owe a great thanks to Harold Wright for his organization of this very worthy memorial service. In the words of the Minister of Veteran's Affairs 1960 Alfred J. Brooks stated that "Paardeberg Day is an anniversary comparable to Vimy Ridge of the Battle of Britain."

Fourteen New Brunswicker died during the Battle of Paardeberg and the Boer War. The Honour Roll was read with a representative reading a short biography of each – providing a very personal reference for each of the fallen.

The two soldiers' biographies honoured on the Trinty South Africa Memorial are included below.

Corporal Frederick William Withers Great Great Grand nephew Officer Cadett Connor Withers read his biography.

Corporal Frederick William Withers had previous militia service with the 3rd (NB) Regiment, Canadian Artillery for six years prior to his Boer War enlistment. Born in Saint John in 1871, Frederick worked as a machinist with the Maritime Nail Works. Apparently, he was ill the night before the battle for Cronje's Laager at Paardeberg, but he insisted on going into the fight. He was killed in action with G Company, Royal Canadian Regiment on 27 February 1900. He was buried at the Vendusiedrift Gardend n of Remembrance (Paardeberg).

Private Joseph Marshall Johnston - The Royal NB Regiment presented the biography of Private Joseph Marshall Johnston had previous militia service with the 62nd Regiment, St. John Fusilers which he joined in 1898. He was born in the former City of Portland, N.B. in 1877. Joseph worked on the railway at the time of his enlistment. He was killed in action at the Battle of Paardeberg on 27 February 1900 as a member of G Company, Royal Canadian Regiment. He was buried at the Vendusiedrift Garden of Remembrance Paardeberg.






The Ultimate Result of Mechanical Failure on the High Seas



The recent grounding of the MSC Baltic III on Newfoundland's west coast on February 15th is reminiscent of the 1981 grounding of the MV OPAL here in Saint John.

The Baltic's stern is wedged into the seabed with 75% of the hull is now on the seabed. The vessel has cracks and holes in the hull and looks like the ships back is broken – as there appears to be a bend mid ship. No pollution has been reported to date.

The Opal was a 6,000-ton cargo ship which similarly suffered mechanical failure while navigating the Bay of Fundy near Saint John during high winds and rough seas. The ship was under tow towards Saint John harbour when the tow line broke and the ship was driven ashore by the powerful waves resting the ship on the shore near Red Head.
