Last Sunday at Trinity: Last Sunday Trinity celebrated the Second Sunday of Lent and we honored St. Patrick. We often these days love the celebration of St. Patrick as it is a day, March 17th to frequent our most-loved bars and restaurants wearing our rarely worn green apparel.

St. Patrick's story, one that most may not have heard or have since forgotten, dates back to his birth in the year 387 to a faithful family, having a father who was a Deacon and being a grandson of a Presbyter – yet his

life went off in a different direction. He was carried off by pirates at the age of sixteen, sold to a heathen prince in Ireland who put him to work as a livestock handler. He lived this marginal life for some six years and it was during this time of isolation, that he grew in his prayer life. So much so, he, through a dream, changed his lot in life. As a result of his early life, he missed his formal education, and what some might think this would be his weakness became his strength as he focused upon his prayer life with the pagan kings.

As bishop he aligned himself with the theology of Paul and King David the Psalmist in that he was passionate about the extent of God's reign being of the whole of His creation. He used the three-leaf clover to visually explain the Trinity – asking if what they see is one leaf or three – to which they respond as both. It is both, the Trinity, Father, Son and Holy Spirit at the same time it is God. Three persons in one.

Luke's gospel for us on Sunday continued on theme I focused upon as being that of the interrupter we talked about the week prior with the 40 days and 40 nights in the desert. During this Lent, can we use this Lenten Season as an interrupter in our lives so that we take some much-needed time to focus upon ourselves, our own spiritual health. In doing so are we like Jesus who at times feel there are threats yet still speak out or do we keep ourselves quiet knowing our voice would matter. Jesus took His orders from His Father and we take ours from Jesus' teachings.

Message Focus – As St. Patrick had a sorted front end of life – the least likely may well become Saints

Call to Action – For us to use our voice and our actions consistent to what Jesus would have done.



Thoughts to live by:









What if you had the opportunity to offer Jesus Communion?





There was time for the presentation, thoughtful questions and reflection. The morning started off with the Litany from the BCP followed by several of the presentations with prayers at lunchtime. Donna Goss provided a lovely hot lunch for all which was thoroughly enjoyed – thank you Donna for your culinary delights. Following lunch we had the final two presentations.

This program moved into a craft activity which for most of us, was something new. We had the materials supplied by David Goss to make our own Prayer Beads. One

could use the different colors, objects and or letters to create a personal string of Prayer Beads which would be helpful as a Prayer Aid when entering into prayer. The photo of the two Prayer Beads has the initials of my family, one by one – reminding me to pray for each one as I go down from top to bottom. Thank you, David for bringing this very meaningful idea to our Lenten Retreat.

Planning for the Finale!


The regulations in New Brunswick, which differ from province to province in Canada, – requires the professional expertise of a licenced Funeral Director of your choice, to care for the body up to and including the body preparation (embalming or cremation) after which time the remaining services are optional to the family to arrange which

are offered fully by the Funeral business or for those who call Trinity home your Parish Church.

I offer my services to anyone who would wish to discuss any and all arrangements they would desire at your convenience. To this end, Trinity has several pre-planned funerals on file — which will be a starting point at the very least with your family when the time has arrived. Planning when we are in good spirits is a good thing, thus putting down on record our wishes and relieving our families of making decisions in one of the most stressful times in life with possibly having little information on what their loved one might have desired.








The fundraising is actively underway and the challenge for Trinity is the short season for the work to be scheduled and completed as it requires commitment from all skilled workers, the Masonry Craft, the Window (protective glass) trades, the Stain Glass expertise along with the Plaster / Painters – their independent schedules to all align. As with the past capital projects over the past eight years, Trinity needs to have the funding in place / secured prior to committing the work as not to put undue strain on the ongoing finances of the parish. At this point all the contractors are awaiting confirmation from Trinity prior to committing their schedule for this project.

Unlike the Trinity Steeple project, this project does not lend itself to be broken up in phases as the key component for this project is access and the cost of multiple erection of scaffolding would increase the project costs significantly.

The ideal time to have this work done would have the project commence by June 1st and completed by early to mid August. This timeframe would be the least disruptive to Trinity and the use of its' facility with the second option being the fall, which would for the most part disrupt the tourism opportunities and early fall Trinity programing as the Sanctuary would be off limits during the majority of the project period.

This is the last of the known significant restoration projects for Trinity with the remainder of projects being part of ongoing maintenance of the buildings' elements.

We need to be reminded of the facts in light of so much mis-information:
