Last Sunday at Trinity: Last Sunday Trinity celebrated the Fifth Sunday of Lent with the Gospel Scripture John 12:1-8.

We are nearing the end of the Lenten Journey as next week we will be honoring the arrival of Jesus as He entered Jerusalem for the last time. We will gather on the road side waiving our palm branches and shouting our Hosanna's. Then we will walk with Him through Holy Week commemorating the Last Supper, the Upper Room, the Foot Washing, on to the Garden of Gethsemani, the Arrest, the Mock Trial and then up the foot path to the top of Golgotha and the Crucifixion. All this in a mere week of time. Much to take in if we truly could ever do so.

Here we find ourselves in the home of Jesus' friend, Lazarus with his sisters Martha and Mary with Mary being the centre of the story for us. Not dismissing as Judas Iscariot takes exception at

the expression of true love Mary had for Jesus by applying her expensive perfume on Jesus' feet.

We find a whole series of little character sketches in this reading.

There is Martha who served in a very practical way and in doing so showed all there and Jesus Himself her love for Him. Many of us do the same for those we love by showing our love in ways we can give of ourselves our skills or talents. There is Mary who showed in a very physical way her love for Jesus and there is Judas who takes issue with Mary's actions for his own selfish needs.

We may wonder if Mary sensed that this would be the last time Jesus would be at her home. We don't know, but we do know that when you love someone you are able to sense things that others around them are not able to sense. It just seems that Mary had this certain feeling that she needed to do something special for Jesus. Maybe it was the way He looked at her when He came into the house. Maybe it was something He had said earlier that suddenly clicked in her heart and mind.

Mary knows that the greatest gift she can give Jesus is herself.

Mary pours out her heart, her future, herself and her glory. She holds nothing back. She is a living example of the depth of love that a person can have for the LORD.

Through Mary we get to see;

- Love's extravagance Giving of her whole being her life savings no doubt in the perfume
- Love's humility Anointing Jesus feet not His head humbling herself
- Love's unselfconsciousness As a woman in a man's world not giving this a thought

Beyond his professional commitments, Eric has a passion for sailing and enjoys installing and repairing marine systems on recreational vessels.


Eric officially begins his new role today. Please join us in welcoming him to this exciting new chapter within the Mission!





The Great East Window Campaign 2025


The fundraising is actively underway – below you will see the fundraising progress to date graphically displayed in the Thermometer.


The East Window Exterior

Did You Know This?



The Leaning Tower of Pisa is the bell tower of Pisa Cathedral, built in the Field of Miracles. Its' construction began in 1173 AD with the laying of a 3-meter-deep slab, upon which the walls were built. When the building reached the third floor, it was noticed that it was beginning to lean. We are talking about a 14,500-ton tower built on 3-meter-deep foundations resting on sandy and silt soil.

After detecting the slope, the engineers of the time built the walls of the remaining floors so that the height of the floor on the most sunken side was greater than its height on the other side, thus compensating for the angle of inclination. This tilted the tower even further due to the sinking of the foundations to a greater extent on the already sunken side than on the other due to the increased weight on that side.

Construction lasted 199 years, and the various stops in the process were one of the reasons that allowed the soil to become compacted. The compacted clay soil has been the reason the tower hasn't collapsed, withstanding four earthquakes without toppling over. However, if left standing on that type of soil, this jewel would eventually collapse. So modern engineering was needed.

Modern engineers calculated the tower's centre of gravity, and from the calculations it was concluded that the tower would collapse if a slope of more than 5.44 degrees was reached. The tower was closed in 1990 for repairs. 361 holes, 40 meters deep, were dug, and 90 tons of concrete were injected into the ground. (That's 361 column, with 13 stories high, driven in the ground). In foundation jargon, piles were driven under the slab. This is like placing columns that penetrate the unstable soil layer and "drive" into the deeper, stable soil layer to keep the slab equally stable.

The earth was then removed from the least sunken side of the tower so that it would sink on that side and reduce its inclination to the original four degrees, and finally steel anchors were used to fix the tower's bases to the ground, stabilizing it.



The tower could have been left vertical, but they didn't want the tower to lose its fame and tourist value due to its leaning. After confirming that it could stand for 300 years without leaning, the tower was reopened to the public.


The current Leaning Tower of Pisa Tour Ticket start at \$62 Canadian and takes 1hr 10 minutes which includes the Baptistry, Pisa Cathedral and Leaning Tower of PISA guided tour.

The Pisa Baptistry of St. John is a Roman Catholic ecclesiastical building which construction started in 1152 and completed 1363. In the tradition of the church, one did not get admittance to the church unless they were Baptized which is the reason that the Baptismal Font in most age-old churches is located at the entrance. In the case of Pisa, the Baptisms would have been done in a separate building.



Saint John's Uptown Peninsula The Peninsula is known as having the three steeples with Trinity to the far left, centre the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception on Waterloo Street and the one to the right being the old St. Andrews St. David United Church which has been sold and vacant for a number of years. Thanks to Trinity's parishioners, the Saint John community and those who have a love for Trinity across the miles, the three-year restoration capital program 2019,2020 & 2021 assured Trinity's Steeple to stand tall and the most recent 2024 capital program seen the restoration of the twelve-bell carillon and the upgrade to the 1926 four face tower clock. All in assuring Trinity's presence and musicality for the years to come.




