



Services and Gatherings over Holy Week & Easter:

Maundy Thursday







It was great to return to the tradition of a Shared Meal together prior to the Maundy Thursday Service. Thank you to all the great cooks, Trinity faithful kitchen angels and the twenty-three who came out and made this a great supper. We were all quite well fed as we entered into the Maundy Thursday service.

Good Friday



The Good Friday three-hour service was well attended once again. Thank you to Louise Dodge-Hall for the wonderful staging of the four stations shown below; The Upper Room & Foot Washing, The Garden of Gethsemane, The Trial and Golgotha – The Cross. This was the second year for having this journey part of the Good Friday program. Upon arrival, those present were given the opportunity to pick up a small stone. To hold this through the first part of the service and bring it with them through the walk around the stations in the second hour. All were encouraged to put their cares and worries into the stone and place it at the foot of the cross at the completion of the stations.

The First Hour was focused on Reflections on the Cross.

What the Cross means in its' physical form and what it means to us as Christians. During this time, we listened to the lyrics of the song titled, New Again – by Brad Paisley and Sara Evans – worth the listen to if you can access it on your mobile devise.

The Second Hour was focused upon Christs' Last 24 Hours – where we revisited Christs moments in the Upper Room where he shared His Last Supper with His Disciples and Washed their feet. Then on to the Garden of Gethsemane where Christ was arrested, on to the Mock Trial we and then on upwards to the top of Golgotha for the Crucifixion.

The Third Hour the focus was upon the Christ's Seven Last Words. Father Thomas Graham narrated the Seven Last Words and as each word was completed a candle was extinguished. At the completion of our



three-hour Good Friday service – all were encouraged to pick up a small wooden cross.

The small wooden cross has been part of my ministry since my days back in St. Mark's Anglican Church Wpg MB, 2006, where my friend, Modest Demchuk, would make them for us. Upon his last wishes, he asked me to keep the small wooden cross ministry going. I have made over 3,000 of these small wooden crosses and they are all over the world – as a number of these were given out during my Camino pilgrimages in 2017 and 2022.

These crosses you see here around the edge of the candle table – are somewhat unique as they are made from 1880 Trinity wood.

Easter Sunday 2025








Last Sunday at Trinity: Last Sunday Trinity celebrated the <u>Resurrection of our Lord</u> – Easter Sunday having the Easter Story from the Gospel of John, John 20:1-18. This Easter I chose to call our reflection to the

role of Mary Magdalene and why of all the ones' Jesus could have revealed Himself to, He chose Mary Magdalene



The Gospel of John's record of the Resurrection account is a little different than the other three gospel writers remembering that John wrote his gospel well after Jesus' death and we hear from his words what we are to embrace because Jesus was born, lived, died and was resurrected for us. The Gospel of John provides us with what is considered the most personal Resurrection story of all the Gospel accounts.

We often focus upon the male characters in scripture leaving the women barely a footnote in our conversation. This Easter, I switched it up and brought Mary Magdalene to the forefront not to lessen what Easter is all about, the Resurrection of our Lord, however if we did not have Mary's story, we would not have had the first-person account reveal of the resurrected Jesus.

So, we should ask ourselves, why did Jesus choose Mary Magdalene over all the others He had access to, to reveal Himself on this Easter morning? What message was Jesus sending them and us today by choosing Mary Magdalene over the others? We know there was nothing that Jesus did that was accidental. He had it firmly in his plans all along to reveal Himself to Mary Magdalene.

We have it in scripture, Luke's Gospel, that Jesus cured Mary Magdalene of her evil spirits, her past life and by this, Mary came into her new life, following and providing for Jesus and His Disciples for their basic needs. One would say from this experience Mary's 'eyes of her heart' were fully opened at this time.

Mary arrives first at the empty tomb in the early morning in the dark. She was there because of her devoted relationship of caring for Jesus over these past years and wished to be there showing her love for Him even at his death. She sees what she sees, the stone rolled away and runs to tell the others. How does what we see or what are willing to see determine what we believe? Jesus teaches us that we need to look with the 'eyes of our heart' and not just our physical eyes to recognize the Risen Lord among us in this world.

The account of the Empty Tomb continues and we have Mary in her state of shock speaking to whom she believed to be the gardener and it was not until the moment that the man said her name, **Mary**, did she understand the one she was talking to was indeed her Lord, Jesus. From the sound of her name, she recognized truly who this man was.

In Jesus' last command to Mary, He says to her, "Do not hold on to me, because I have not yet ascended to the Father. But go to my brothers and say to them, I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God." This has a very powerful message for them and us today. For them, they needed to recognize that Jesus (God) in human form cannot be forever no different that it is for us to say goodbye to our loved ones – there is a time for our physical time together and there will be a time for our eternal presence with one another at God's bidding. We, as Christians, are fortunate that God gives us the path of comfort for us to handle this separation and that path for us is the promise of the Resurrection. For this to be a reality, Jesus needed to ascend to His Father and by doing this Jesus gives us HOPE.

Jesus chose to spread the word that His Church will forever be built upon would come through Mary Magdalene where she had first account when she said, "I have seen the Lord" to which we say, "Alleluia! Christ is Risen. The Lord is risen indeed. Alleluia.

This Sunday at Trinity This Sunday we will celebrate the 2nd Sunday of Easter and Trinity will be welcoming Oliver Lawrence Bell-Estabrooks and his family as Oliver will be welcomed into Christs' Church through his baptism.



This spring I received an email from Ian MacPherson, Rev. Canon C. Gordon Lawrence's grandson from Swastika (yes this is the name of his town), Ontario wishing to have a visit at Trinity. We arranged the time at Trinity for Wednesday, April 23rd where I met Ian and his daughter Skye and we spent an enjoyable time together at Trinity, reminiscing much of his grandfather's story, as they have been active in putting his grandfathers' story together. They spent a valued morning having pre-arranged a time at the NB Museum. After Trinity they were going to the Masonic Hall next door where his grandfather was active in the fraternity. On Thursday, the Hampton Museum has pulled a number of items out for them to review and then on to Corinthian Masonic Lodge in Hampton where he served as Master of the Lodge and then on to St. Paul's Anglican Church Hampton. As they have researched, Ian's parents were married at Trinity in 1941.

On our parting, I gave them a package of four small wooden crosses made from Trinity 1880 wood which they warmly accepted. Ian plans to send me some of his research which I will share and place in Trinity's archives. In turn, I offered to copy the Rector's Report from the Trinity Year Books over the years of his grandfather's tenure 1924 thru 1948 – twenty-four years as Rector of Trinity and send these to him.



The Great East Window Campaign 2025



The caption in the photo: Stained glass depends not on reflected light, like most forms of art do, but on transmitted light.


It is anticipated with the East Window cleaned on both sides and new protective clear covering on the external window face the East Window will be once again brilliant in its' colors having last been cleaned in 1958.

The fundraising is actively underway – below you will see the fundraising progress to date graphically displayed in the Thermometer.

Trinity has received the Heritage Permit for this project. The application for the Saint John Heritage Grant for this project has been submitted.

There are ongoing approaches being made to other options for grant support for this monumental project which will ensure the protection and life ongoing for The Great East Window.

The East Window Story – in brief; The East Window consists of seven large lights, fifteen feet high, surmounted with a head of decorated tracery. It was a gift to the rebuild of Trinity post the Great Fire of 1877 by a past Trinity parishioner then living in London England, Lewis Bliss, Esq.

The East Window is described as an epitome of our Lord's life. The artist created scenes of the Annunciation of the Virgin Mary, The Nativity, The Visit of the Magi, The Presentation in the Temple, The Flight into Egypt, Jesus in the Temple, The Last Supper, The Agony in the Garden, Our Lord before Pilate, The Crucifixion, The Burial and the Resurrection. The East Window also captures images of Moses, David, Isaiah, Jeremiah, Zechariah, Micah, Hosea, Malachi together with the four Evangelists.

At the bottom of the light on the south side is inscribed:

"To the honor and glory of God, and in thankful acknowledgement of many mercies received throughout a life of 87 years and also in loving memory of his father, the Honorable Jonathan Bliss, late Chief Justice and President of the Executive and Legislative Council of the Province of New Brunswick and of his mother, Mary Bliss and of his three brothers, John Worthington, William Blowers and Henry, this window is dedicated by Lewis Bliss, A.D. 1880."

The designer and manufacturer, as noted in the Trinity Church Memorials booklet, – was J. Kempe, Esq. London.

Thank you all for your consideration on this very critical restoration project for Trinity's future.

What a surprise when I opened my email back a couple of weeks ago to learn that one of my walking mates from our 2022 Camino was going back to complete the St. Francis Camino again this spring. Daniel Klein, who lives in Thunder Bay ON, by the time you read this weeks Newsletter will be finishing day thirteen. The top two pictures here were taken after we climbed the Pyrenees France 2022 – an aggressive hike for certain ending day one back then at Roncesvalles. This Camino route through to Santiago de Compostela is posted at 800 kms (36 days hiking) – it was less than encouraging that first morning that reportedly we only covered 10 kms climbing the Pyrenees. Daniel had posed at the same signage **Daniel Klein – 2025 Camino** upon leaving Roncesvalles on his day three. Another learning from our Camino

2022 – there is lodging half way up the Pyrenees which Daniel took part of this time. For those familiar with the St. Francis Camino Daniel has passed through the following; Orisson / Borda, Roncesvalles, Zubiri, Pamplona (where the running of the bulls takes place), Puente la Reina, Estella, Los Arcos, Logrono and Najera.

During my 2017 half Camino I experienced only 1 hour of rain during my seventeen days walking from Leon through to Santiago and during the 2022 full Camino only 1 ½ hours of rain over 36 days walking – to date Daniel has had more rain than we experienced in his first 3 days – more normal weather this year than my past two experiences
